

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What is Ganga Prem Hospice?

Ganga Prem Hospice is a spiritually orientated, non-profit hospice for terminally ill cancer patients. The Hospice will provide medical, social, emotional and spiritual support for individuals and their loved ones as they face life threatening cancer, and in their



ongoing grief. The 27-bed hospice will be constructed at the foot of the Himalayas on the bank of the river Ganga in Gohri Maphi village near the spiritual and holistic centres of Rishikesh and Haridwar.

Presently, Ganga Prem Hospice is running out-patient monthly cancer clinics in Rishikesh, and home care services for cancer patients in Rishikesh, Haridwar and Dehradun.

A Letter from our Medical Director



"To be able to provide medical care and emotional support to cancer patients will make a huge qualitative difference in their lives and that of their families. The thought that we will be able to relieve terminally ill cancer patients of their pain and prevent their families from financial destitution makes our work worthwhile."

he year 2010-11 was a year when the Ganga Prem Hospice work truly took a leap. With the number of cancer patients served at our monthly cancer clinics having risen almost three times, and the number of home care cancer patients having gone up six times, as compared to the previous year, I had my hands full, both as an oncologist and as the medical director of the project.

Our ultimate objective is to construct a hospice in Rishikesh, which I envision will be an important development in the field of hospice and palliative care in North India. Every month in Rishikesh, I see so many under-privileged men, women and also children stricken with end-stage cancer, that to be able to provide medical care and emotional support to these patients, all free of charge, will make a huge qualitative difference in their lives and that of their families. The thought that we will be able to relieve patients of their pain and mental agony, and prevent their families from financial destitution makes our work worthwhile.

Even now, with our cancer clinics and medical home care programme, I see how happy patients and their families are to receive our aid. Under-privileged patients who otherwise would have had to stand in long queues in hospitals, travel tiring distances to get any medical attention, and who have little money to spend even on basic medicines, now get loving care from a qualified nurse, right at their doorstep. The Ganga Prem Hospice team is on call at all hours of the day. Patients have the attentive ear of a counsellor to whom they speak about their fears and problems, at the Ganga Prem Hospice out-patient cancer clinics. Cancer patients are not left to fend for themselves with my prognosis and consultations alone. They are guided by the Ganga Prem

- Home visits to cancer patients conducted in Rishikesh, Haridwar and Dehradun by a qualified nurse: 752.

Hospice team at every step of their medical journey with our nurse and volunteers accompanying them on hospital visits, paying for their medical costs, getting them free of charge diagnostic tests, approaching various sponsors for aid for their treatment, providing medicines on home care visits twice a week, and even sending pain relief medicines to villages high up in the Himalayas, from where a patient's family member would otherwise have to travel at least 12 hours back and forth to Rishikesh to get any medicine.

It is not easy to quantify the Ganga Prem Hospice work in statistics alone, even if the numbers have been impressive this past year. While the Hospice team has worked for thousands of hours to do what they have done, and the results are evident, it is equally heartening to see how people from all over India and also across the world have added such immense value to the project, giving their time, money, and resources.

The Need for Hospices in India

In India, there are one million cancer patients at any given time. With late detection being the rule rather than the exception, many of these patients go on to suffer untold pain in absence of medical care and pain relief. This is why hospice facilities are so important. When patients cannot cope at home and hospitals are hard pressed to serve patients who are in curative stages, hospices take on the responsibility of looking after the terminally ill.

ospices are very rare in India, and only 16 of India's 28 states and 7 union territories (less than 45%) have any palliative care services at all. Many states in India have absolutely no medical facilities that prescribe morphine.

Every human being has a right to die with dignity and minimal distress. In India, cancer patients cannot achieve this. The concept of hospice is well known in the West, but in India, where palliative care is so desperately needed, it is almost unheard of.

Late diagnosis and inadequate pain relief

India has one million new cancer cases each year. Seventy-five per cent of them are diagnosed at the terminal stage when it is too late to cure or even treat the patient. To make matters worse, there are very few cancer facilities in India and therefore little time or space in overburdened hospitals for the care of the terminally ill. In plain words, this means that every year in India, tens of thousands of cancer patients die agonizing and undignified deaths without medical help and support. Less than 3% of India's cancer patients have access to adequate pain relief. Population density, poverty, bad nutrition, illiteracy, cultural stigma regarding cancer, and lack of awareness about cancer symptoms and palliative care compound the problem.


Lack of palliative care facilities

North India in particular is almost completely bereft of any type of support for the terminally ill. Uttarakhand is one of 19 states in India that have absolutely no provision for palliative care. Although more than 17,000 new cases of cancer are reported in this state every year, cancer facilities are conspicuously absent.

Lack of funding, lack of awareness and interest by the medical profession in general, lack of government support and lack of morphine are some of the major difficulties facing development of hospice and palliative care in India.

The need for hospices in Uttarakhand

The mountainous and isolated nature of most parts of this state make it difficult to reach cancer patients and bring them the necessary awareness about possible help. The activities of Ganga Prem Hospice are aimed at helping create cancer awareness in the state as well as providing free consultation and care.



Review of our Progress this Year

A total of 902 patients were seen at the 14 charitable cancer clinics organised by Ganga Prem Hospice in 2010-11. Of these 902 patients, 420 had cancer and 120 were terminally ill with cancer.

If there was ever a year when the Ganga Prem Hospice project truly blossomed, laid a very strong foundation for the years to come, and brought succour to the largest number of patients the Hospice has ever supported, it has to be the year 2010-11.

The past year has seen several "firsts" for Ganga Prem Hospice: our first ever full-time staff nurse, first full-time international volunteer, first ambulance, first outpatient cancer clinic outside of Rishikesh, the highest number of patients ever served at individual monthly clinics and collectively ever in any year, and the first time that such a large number of organisations and people supported the Hospice by donating to the project in cash and in kind. A total of 902 patients were seen at the Ganga Prem Hospice monthly cancer clinics in Rishikesh and two clinics in Haridwar. Of these patients 420 were cancer patients and 120 were terminally ill. The Ganga Prem Hospice home

care programme grew considerably to include coverage of Haridwar and Dehradun as well as Rishikesh. A qualified nurse visited patients six days a week, eight hours a day. Travelling thousands of kilometers in the Rishikesh, Haridwar and Dehradun areas the home care team was able to bring relief to 56 terminally ill cancer patients, with 752 home visits having taken place in the past year.

On the World Hospice Day, Ganga Prem Hospice held a multi speciality health camp at which 888 patients received free of charge consultations, medicines and tests from well known doctors in the fields of oncology, gynaecology, orthopaedics, ayurveda, dentistry and optometry.

Many organisations across India—public sector, charitable trusts, and private sector companies—started to support Ganga Prem Hospice. We were able to provide medicines free of charge to our patients even when the number of patients grew sharply. Our work grew tremendously but so did our support network. A very dedicated team of volunteers and employees have worked tirelessly to make the Hospice work grow. While Ganga Prem Hospice has cemented its medical care work to emerge as the only palliative care service of its kind in Rishikesh, Haridwar and Dehradun, the Hospice pre-construction work has also progressed. The Hospice architectural and structural designs were polished, all by volunteers who are experts in their own professions, and organisations came forward to donate for construction of their chosen areas in the Hospice, like patients' rooms, wards, a meditation hall and other such facilities.

Overall, for the Ganga Prem Hospice team, which has seen hard times for the project in the past, it was a year of relief and renewed optimism.

Our Activities

Ganga Prem Hospice Services in Rishikesh

Monthly Cancer Clinic

Includes:

- Screening of patients for possibility of cancer;
- Consultation for cancer patients;
- Consultation for terminally ill cancer patients;
- · Counselling for cancer patients and their families;
- Counselling for terminally ill patients and their families:
- Distribution of free medicine:
- Offering of discounted or free of charge diagnostic tests;
- Essential oils and aromatherapy massages for the terminally ill;
- Pick up and drop back ambulance service for terminally ill patients.

Home Care Programme for Terminally III Cancer Patients

Includes:

- 1) Regular visits to patient's home by a:
 - Hospice doctor (whenever possible);
 - Hospice nurse;
 - Complementary therapist (whenever possible); and

- Counsellor (whenever possible).
- 2) Medical care for patient as advised by oncologist,
- 3) Complementary therapies for symptom relief and relaxation for both patient and family,
- 4) Counselling for patient and family,
- 5) Spiritual support for patient and family, and
- 6) General care for patient and family.

Support-a-Cancer-Patient Scheme

Includes:

- Full sponsorship of treatment and medicines cost;
- · Nutritional support;
- Transport for treatment; and
- Other financial support according to need (e.g. clothing, house rent, etc).

Bereavement Support

Includes:

- Help with practical arrangements after the death of patient;
- Counselling helping family members manage the process of grieving; and
- A promise of continued support, as required.



Monthly Cancer Clinics in Rishikesh: April 2010 – March 2011

Head and neck cancers were the most common types of cancers found in patients, followed by breast cancer, at the Ganga Prem Hospice cancer clinics in 2010-11

he Ganga Prem Hospice monthly cancer clinics are held on the last Sunday of every month in Rishikesh at the Sardarni Nanki Devi Punjab Sindh Kshetra Hospital in Rishikesh, from 9 AM to 1 PM.

The Rishikesh cancer clinic team includes surgical oncologists, gynaecologists, general physicians and ayurvedacharyas, assisted by counsellors, alternate therapy practitioners, pharmacists and volunteers.








47% of cancer patients at the Ganga Prem Hospice Rishikesh cancer clinics were in the 41-60 year age-group.



At the Ganga Prem Hospice cancer clinics, patients not only get free of charge oncological consultations, but are also gently counselled about their disease and supported emotionally, given information about how they can get financial aid for their treatment, and which hospitals offer cancer treatment opportunities.

48% of the total number of patients seen at the Ganga Prem charitable clinics were cancer patients. The number of patients coming to the monthly cancer clinic in Rishikesh went up progressively in the year 2010-11.





Multi Speciality Health Camp and Cancer Screening Camps

Ganga Prem Hospice marked the World Hospice Day on 9 October 2010 by organising a multispeciality charitable health camp in Rishikesh which saw 888 patients get free of charge consultations.

- August 28th 2010 Cancer and gynaecology camp in Haridwar: A total number of 49 patients received consultations, out of whom 11 were cancer patients and 3 were terminally ill. Consultations and medicines were given free of charge.
- October 9th 2010 World Hospice Day health camp in Rishikesh

The Ganga Prem Hospice health camp saw 888 patients in the cardiology, oncology, gynaecology, orthopaedic, ayurveda, dentistry and optometry departments. In the oncology department, 54 patients received

consultations, out of whom 24 were cancer patients and 8 were terminally ill. Free medicines, free blood and bone density tests and free spectacles were distributed at the health camp and all consultations were given free of charge.

- January 29th 2011 Cancer screening camp in Haridwar
 - 55 patients received consultations.
 - 29 were cancer patients and 15 were terminally ill.
 - Consultations and medicines were given free of charge.

Home Care Programme

Of the 56 home care cancer patients served by Ganga Prem Hospice in 2010-11, 41% were above the age of 60.

he Ganga Prem Hospice Home Care Programme reaches palliative medical care to cancer patients in their own homes across Rishikesh, Haridwar and Dehradun. A team of a trained nurse (doctor and aromatherapist) visits advanced cancer patients in their homes: six days a week, eight hours a day. Cancer patients in a fifty-kilometre radius area are served by the Ganga Prem Hospice home care service. The service is the only professional home care service of its kind in the north Indian Himalayan state of Uttarakhand. With support from the Indo-American Cancer Association, Ganga Prem Hospice, employed a full-time qualified nurse to

serve advanced cancer patients in their homes everyday. everyday.





Our Financial Position

Ganga Prem Hospice, Shradha Cancer Care Trust can accept donations from within and outside India.

- In the year 2010-11, Rs 44,41,216 was added to the Shradha Cancer Care Trust income from donations and sponsorships;
- A sum of Rs 1,44,337 was directly expended on patient treatment, hospitalisation, purchase of medicines, diagnostic
 tests etc. This does not include the medicines donated free of charge to patients at the cancer clinics or home care
 visits, or the value of oncological consultations and nursing care given to patients throughout the year;
- Shradha Cancer Care Trust started to receive monthly donations from companies/organisations which went a long way
 towards sustaining the running costs of Ganga Prem Hospice activities.

- To approach charitable foundations, companies and corporations, as well as individuals, who will give financial backing
 to the project;
- To expand our volunteer force for both our palliative care service and fundraising efforts;
- To create greater awareness about our project, both in India and abroad;
- To collaborate with other palliative care centres, both in India and abroad in order to increase our knowledge and ability to serve;
- To improve our system of electronic and written record keeping of all patient data and palliative care services; and
- To sustain a cohesive network of support between our team and our patients and their families.

The Sebastions are an amazing team, beautiful to watch and see the compassion that flows between them for the patients, and the dedication of all the other volunteers and staff is deeply inspiring and soul affirming, as this is the kind of grassroots work that makes my heart sing.

Ganga Prem is hospice care in its purest form, providing grassroots care to those at end of life. The population is from the wealthy to the fiscally poor. The poorest, to me are not poor. Indian culture is one of a close knit family, they all care for one another in such a natural, loving, selfless way, as well as the nurse, Sister Sebastion, and her husband who drove us, gathered medications, and assists in providing education, reassurance and a healing loving presence. The families cared for us as well, every home provides something to drink and often snacks, refusing to take no for an answer. I find the poorest tend to be the richest, in sharing, it was impossible to say no.

Nurse Sebastion assessed the patient and the whole situation globally. What is the patients' greatest need or needs that can be acknowledged and resolved or begin to be resolved. As with end-of-life care in US and Canada, there is little difference, as a nurse you can not expect to go in, take away all the physical pain, the families and patients' emotional or spiritual pain. Allowing the grace of hospice care to flow, listening, reflecting, holding hands and hugging, enjoying *chai* together, allowing tears, reinforcing strengths and being truthful about the situation. I found there are more similarities than differences between a third world country's hospice and the West. The difference I did see, was again the tightly knit family, this tends to be an issue in the West where priorities are different and far more materially-driven. I feel privileged to have been gifted the opportunity to serve these amazing patients. I was welcomed with open arms as part of the team. I do not speak Hindi, yet this was never a real barrier. I find we speak, cry, express so much with our eyes. I hope to come back.
